IAPHS needs to raise \$30,000 in 2016 to support the development of activities serving population health scientists and professionals and fostering science and its application.

Where will the money go?

Mainly, expanding the Website to include features for members. These new features will enable members to find collaborators in other disciplines, learn about opportunities in population health, and access materials and news that represent developments related to population health across different disciplines and sectors.

Specific features include:

- A searchable database for identifying individuals and organizations with population health expertise.
- A Blog, interviews with scientists and practitioners, and research highlights – features that will depend on hiring an editorial assistant to back up the efforts of volunteers.
- Tools and resources for professional development.

Other needs:

- Outreach efforts to attract an initial membership that is diverse with respect to discipline, career stage, demographics, and orientation to basic and applied research.
- Developing structures and materials that will support an elected leadership of the organization and make it easier to recruit distinguished leaders as well as early-career professionals.
- Legal and administrative costs.
